



How to Support Governance and Student Engagement in Erasmus+

Objectives of this session


- Get inspired on the example of the Governance Model of the European University Alliances;





Figure 4 *Student involvement in the alliance governance structure (n=20)*

Even though the student engagement in the EIU is not perfect is a starting point for a broader discussion on how to better involve student representatives on the decision-making process of Erasmus+







Actions & Activities

How do I start to engage students in ECHE implementation?

A conceptual framework for meaningful involvement

The three phases offer the opportunity to co-create with students

Design/ Conceptualisation

Meeting with the student representatives and get their feedback, ideas and priorities, selecting different points of the ECHE

Implementation

Think together about how you can create initiatives to tackle ECHE commitments based on the Guidelines. Allocate resources and support to students also have incentives

Evaluation

Design joint evaluation mechanisms, combining data interpretation and experience. Divide tasks and give them a mandate to report back to you.

Student engagement cycle:





Design: Identify key moments to gather

student representatives, and even every interested students, and get their perspectives on relevant areas

Implementation:

Work together in setting up initiatives, giving the students the lead in those where the peer to peer component can be more beneficial - including social activities but also problem solving situations.

Three phases of engagement for 4 ECHE hats

- Before mobility
- During mobility
- After mobility
- Broader internationalisation



Now it's time to brainstorm!

Discussion on student engagement

- We will divide you in smaller groups;
- The main question is: how can students/student organisations be involved in the various ECHE cycles (before, during and after), either in planning, implementation or evaluation?;
- You will have 15-20 minutes.

Brainstorm on and create together a Student Engagement Strategy (e.g., how to inform, involve implement/cooperate)

Some of the aspects to choose from (non exhaustive lists)!

- Provide active support to incoming mobile participants throughout the process of finding accommodation;
- Integrate incoming mobile participants into the wider student community and in the Institution's everyday life;
- Ensure that outgoing mobile participants are well prepared for their activities abroad, including blended mobility, by undertaking activities to achieve the necessary level of linguistic proficiency and develop their intercultural competences.

There are more!

- Provide <u>appropriate mentoring and support arrangements for</u> <u>mobile participants</u>, including for those pursuing blended mobility;
- Encourage and support mobile participants upon return to act as ambassadors of the Erasmus+ Programme, promote the benefits of mobility and actively engage in building alumni communities.
