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Student outbound mobilities – obstacles





Systemic – lack of funding causing inability to satisfy high demand to study abroad

Structural – obstacles at the level of faculties, departments, programs: **no mobility windows**, **limited flexibility of curriculums**, **problems in recognition of courses**, **problems with recognition of compulsory courses taken abroad**, **difficulties with completion of compulsory courses at home university** (to avoid prolongation of studies)

Individual – personal reasons preventing students to go abroad (personal, economic) Different problems require different solutions

Systemic & individual obstacles

Solutions

- Increase of available funds
- Persuasion & motivation (outreach, info campaigns, teachers, foreign offices, but especially peers)
- Internationalization at home





Internationalization at Home



- Closely connected with internationalization abroad
- Limitation/reduction of uncertainty (language deficiencies, low selfconfidence, strengthening of motivation and courage to experience study abroad)
- Creation of an international environment at home institution
- Integration of students of Czech study programs with students of programs in English
- Substitution for students with serious individual/personal obstacles preventing them to study abroad

How to mitigate structural obstacles?



Main problems

- No mobility windows
- Limited flexibility of curriculums
- Problems with recognition of courses
- Problems with recognition of compulsory courses taken abroad
- Difficulties with completion of compulsory courses at home university

Solutions

- Introduction of mobility windows within the curriculum
- Optimal use of flexibility of the credit study system
- Change of the institutional culture vis a vis recognition of compulsory courses taken at other educational institutions
- A better use of recorded lectures and electronic materials and other on-line learning tools
